A Message from Rev. Erica Avena

Dear Niantic Community Church friends and members:

This is the Easter season and the season of mysterious resurrection. Jesus encountered many people in his resurrected form and had a profound effect on them. They report that he still had his wounds, yet he walked and moved among them, even eating with them. The gospels record that Thomas needed to see Jesus' hands and feet with his own eyes, to touch the wound in Jesus' side with his own hand -- to believe it. And he did. There's a good story there about faith, but there is also a story about Jesus' identity after his resurrection. He remained wounded.

I have learned a lot about "the disabled God" from members of my churches who have told me about their own experiences with disabilities. About all of us are disabled at least temporarily during our lives – minor injuries, pregnancies, recovery from illnesses, accidents, as well as longer term and chronic conditions – mean we need to make appropriate accommodations. And there are just as many hidden disabilities as there are visible ones.

While the story of Jesus' resurrection is surely an account of his strength, it is also an account of what he did after being wounded. Jesus walked the road to Emmaus on feet which had been pierced in crucifixion. All of what he did in resurrection would have been made harder for him by the presence of his wounds. Taking the disabled Jesus seriously means understanding that in his disabled body, Jesus was able to continue his ministry, and to reveal God's love. The disabled Jesus appeared to the first disciples, walking with them on the road, the disabled Jesus cooked breakfast for them on the beach. His wounds witnessing to the fullness of his life and identity.

Maybe it is time to re-think who embodies the spirit of the risen Lord. Maybe we do not need to hold ourselves to impossible standards of perfection, rather maybe it is exactly the lives that we have led which prepare us to share the good news authentically.

It is the season of mysterious resurection. Halleluiah, Christ is risen!

April Message from Rev. Kaleigh Rasmussen



In 2019, I was elected by the Greater New Jersey Conference to serve as a delegate to the 2020 United Methodist General Conference, which is the highest legislative body of the United Methodist Church. This body meets every 4 years and clergy and lay delegates are elected from their respective annual conferences (NCC is part of the New England Annual Conference). In 2020, in case you forgot, there was a global pandemic which caused the General Conference to be postponed to 2021..and then again to 2022...and then finally the global meeting is happening this year from April 22-May 4 in

Charlotte, North Carolina with 860 delegates from around the world, and I am honored to be one of them.

THIS (bit.ly/UMCGCVideo) is a great video highlighting what the General Conference is and does, but I'll also explain here. The UMC General Conference is the body that sets official policies for the church and the body that speaks as the entire denomination. It is the body that makes changes to our Book of Discipline and Book of Resolutions. We will spend the greater part of the first week going through over 1,000 pieces of legislation in our assigned legislative committees, and then the second week in a larger plenary session where most of the voting will happen. Legislation is submitted by United Methodists worldwide and by various boards and agencies. A fun fact — any member of the United Methodist Church can submit legislation to change the Book of Discipline! We will also spend time in worship, eating meals together, and hearing reports, and I'm told there might be some fun as well. They expect nearly 10,000 United Methodists to descend on Charlotte for this conference.

There are three major legislative priorities coming to the floor at General Conference this year, and we call them the three R's: Regionalization, Revision, and Removal.

- Adopt worldwide regionalization -- This plan restructures the UMC based on equity and
 respect for missional context, creating regional conferences and is a critical first step toward
 decolonizing both polity and relationships. It keeps us connected as a global church and offers
 autonomy in regional decision-making as well as allowing future
- 2. Adopt revised Social Principles The Social Principles are a prayerful and thoughtful effort on the part of the General Conference to speak to the human issues in the contemporary world. The proposed revisions are more succinct, more theologically grounded, better reflect the nature of the global Church. They include removing "The practice of homosexuality is incompatibility with Christian teaching" and changing the definition of marriage from "one man and one woman" to "two people"
- 3. **Remove anti-LGBTQ+ language and discrimination** The Goal is to leave the 2024 Book of Discipline void of any language that targets LGBTQ+ persons. This goal honors regionalization and create a blank slate for a new structure and future regional conferences.



Liza has contributed to nearly every part of Maintenance at NCC. She has painted pretty much anywhere you look, inside and outside our church. Additionally, she's been seen up on the roof more than once!

Exciting NEW Partnership with A Sacred Place

NCC is excited to share the great news that in partnership with A Sacred Place, we have received a \$2,500 grant from the New England United Methodist Conference's Board of Church and Society to reenergize and support the Storybook Project at York Correctional Institution (CI) right here in Niantic!

A Sacred Place is a local nonprofit supported by many of our congregation members, that provides programs to incarcerated women at York CI. Due to the pandemic, many of those programs were no longer active, but in the last few months the prison has re-opened to volunteers and A Sacred Place's programs are once again kicking off.

Update: Pastor Kaleigh has been teaching the "Houses of Healing" program weekly at the prison since January (which has just concluded). This program helps inmates to identify, express and manage their feelings. It fosters self-understanding, emotional and spiritual growth along with encouraging responsibility and accountability toward one's self and others.

We are so excited about this reimagined and reenergized partnership and look forward to having church members join in the partnership!

This offering will last three Sundays in April, and will focus on three ministries we have with New London Homeless Hospitality Center (NLHHC), the Anne Davis Meal Ministry (DINE), and Care & Share of East Lyme. The Faith In Action leaders heading up these efforts are Sandy Tarallo, Donna Hathaway, and Sharon Kittel. These amazing women give many many hours to these causes and we are lucky to have them as representatives of NCC.

<u>April 14:</u> Moment for Mission during Worship by the Executive Director of NLHHC, Rev. Cathy Zall. During the Coffee Hour, we will have a table to help sign people up to walk in or sponsor NCC in the Walk to End Homelessness, and to make overall donations for the Special Offering. These donations will be split evenly between the three ministries mentioned in the above paragraph.

<u>April 21:</u> We will simply have a table at Coffee Hour, though the focus will be Care & Share of East Lyme. Please stop by to pick up a flyer, to ask questions, and if you wish, make a donation for the Special Offering.

April 28: We will have a table at Coffee Hour with the focus on DINE. DINE needs your attention as a volunteer for the community meals they serve on the 4th Saturday of every month. We will also be accepting donations for the last time for the Special Offering at this time. This will have to be short due the quarterly meeting happening at 10:30, so please make your time count.

Following the quarterly meeting, those who have signed up for the Walk to End Homelessness will be heading over to New London at noon.

A New and Different Kind of Special Offering for April

On December 20, 2023, the Hartford Courant wrote that "...From city streets to the rural woods, new data from the Connecticut Coalition to End Homelessness revealed that more than 1,000 people are currently living without shelter in the state — a level that they say is the highest ever recorded."

According to the Low Income Housing Coalition, "...In the Norwich-New London metropolitan area, the Fair Market Rent for a two-bedroom apartment is \$1,145. In order to afford this rate, a household must earn \$22.02 an hour; a minimum-wage earner would have to work 107 hours per week."

Fox 61 reported on January 11, 2023 that "In New London County, 12.2% of families face food insecurity," and Feeding America reported that in New London county in 2021 there were 29,440 people who were food insecure, and that it would cost an estimated \$21 million dollars to make up the food budget shortfall.

So what can the Niantic Community Church do for our community? For three Sundays in April (4/14, 4/21 & 4/28), NCC pays special attention to the issues of Homelessness and Hunger with our 2nd Special Offering. This offering is about marching, collecting groceries, sponsoring marchers or donating, and as many have already begun doing in our congregation, we can volunteer our time:

- 1. **We turn to DINE!** which you have heard about already through the Youth's Club 26 pantry awareness, and by the tireless NCC volunteers who monthly buy and prepare meals for the Hungry in New London in the Anne Davis Meal Ministry.
- 2. **We turn to the Care & Share of East Lyme**, whose volunteers take in locally collected food and make sure it is distributed to those most in need in our area.
- 3. And we turn to NLHHC (New London Homeless Hospitality Center) who provide a safe place out of the weather for those who have no where to call home. They are holding the March to End Homelessness on 4/28. beginning April 14th at Coffee Hour, you can sign up to walk in or sponsor our marchers.




