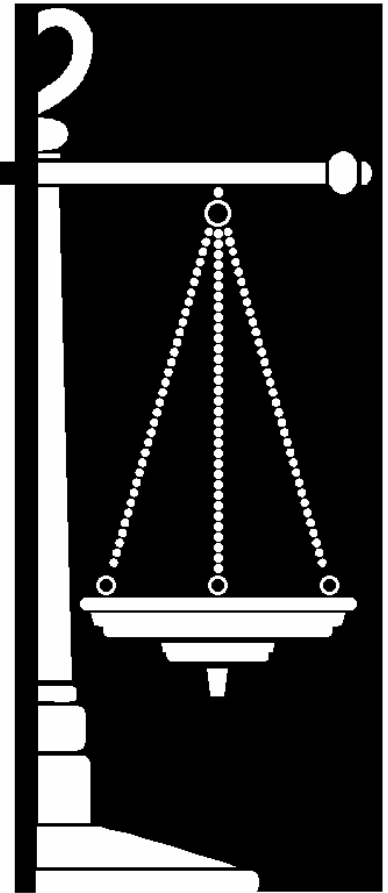

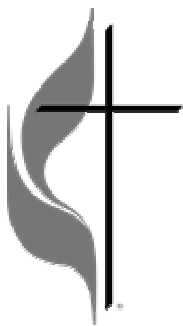
At Niantic Community Church, we are able to pledge annually in three ways: (1) to a Local Operations Budget, (2) to an Outreach Budget, and (3) to be used "As Needed." One of our core beliefs is that how we care for those in need is at least as important as how we care for ourselves.

Back in the late 1970s the congregation adopted the goal that we spend as much money on concerns outside the congregation as within, which came to be known as the "50-50 Principle." We have never reached that goal, but it continues to be a guiding vision for the congregation.

For 2003, our Operating Budget was \$327,000. Our Outreach Budget was \$85,000, but that does not include special offerings and special appeals, which brings the actual total to more than \$100,000, nor does it include the \$40,000 we raised for Habitat for Humanity. That brings our total Outreach giving to approximately \$150,000 or 46% of our Operating Budget.

It's a good milestone in our journey to faithfulness in stewardship, but we seek to go further. To whom much is given, much is expected.

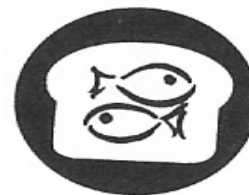

Seeking Justice, Ending Hunger



Bread for the World is a nationwide Christian movement that seeks justice for the world's hungry people by lobbying our nation's decision makers. NCC is a Covenant Church with Bread for the World. Along with our financial support we participate in the annual Offering of Letters Campaign. As individuals we

volunteer in social ministries and give to hunger appeals, but a single decision by Congress can outweigh or multiply our contributions. Bread for the World organizes this annual campaign around legislation that can make a difference in world hunger. Educational material and sample letters are provided to assist in the campaign. Habitat for Humanity of Southeastern Connecticut

NCC has been a Covenant Church with SECT Habitat for Humanity for many years. Habitat's purpose is to build decent and affordable homes in partnership with families in need. Habitat offers interest-free mortgage payments based on actual expenses to build that family's house. The families are actively involved through "sweat equity" in the building of their home. Habitat relies on skilled and unskilled volunteers to build their homes, screen applicants, solicit funding, secure potential building lots, and guide and direct each family as they become first-time homeowners. Habitat especially relies on the church community as the best source to provide reliable and dedicated volunteers.

NCC's long history with Habitat has included many of our members working at various sites, volunteering in the office, serving on its board and committees, including one member serving as its Board President. At our 2000 Annual Meeting, members took a bold step and made a strong commitment to work with other Shoreline Cluster churches in sponsoring a home, which included finding and securing the land, raising over \$70,000 in funds, and building the home along with the family. We also designated a tithe (10%) to be sent to Nicaragua to support an International build. Over two homes were able to be built with that contribution. An ongoing goal of our church community is to actively encourage and support involvement in SECT Habitat for Humanity.

In 2005, Niantic Community Church will be working with Habitat to sponsor and build our second house in S.E. Connecticut.

Special Offerings

Each year we receive two general offerings that are divided between our two denominations. Our gifts are united with others in our denominations to make a bigger impact than we can make alone.

Neighbors in Need-World Communion Sunday

This offering is received on the first Sunday of October, World Communion Sunday. Our gifts support ministries that address hunger, poverty, economic development, human rights, peace making, violence, racial and economic justice, ethnic scholarships, environmental concerns and public policy advocacy.

One Great Hour of Sharing

When One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) began in 1949 leaders from several denominations organized an appeal to support campaigns of Protestant Churches for relief and reconstruction.

Both of NCC's denominational affiliations (UMC & UCC) participate in OGHS. This offering is received on the 4th Sunday in Lent and is directed to refugee ministries, disaster response, and hunger ministries.

A common misconception is that all participating denominations pool their offering's use. In fact, each denomination decides how its members' gifts will be used. Yet though it is not a requirement, all OGHS denominations choose to do part of their ministries through Church World Service. This reflects a shared commitment to work ecumenically when possible, recognizing it is both more practical and better stewardship than creating multiple mission structures. The denominations also use commonly developed resources.

Each year UMC congregations support UMCOR's ministries through OGHS. UMCOR serves millions of people around the world in responding to catastrophic natural disasters, civil unrest and violence, and refugee crises. When the

Women's Center of Southeastern Connecticut

Genesis House – Emergency Shelter

Provides a free, safe haven for women and children who are victims of domestic violence/sexual assault. Advocacy services provide clients access to financial, legal, medical, employment, and other assistance as needed. Agency staff provide 24 hour coverage.



Phoenix House – Transitional Living Program

Residents are women and families left homeless due to domestic violence/sexual assault who need safe, affordable housing and support services provided in a structured environment for up to 24 months. Services include case management, adult educational workshops on parenting skills, nutrition, budgeting, and household maintenance and after-school tutoring and school readiness programs for children.

Crisis Intervention and Counseling

Free, confidential services to survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault. Two 24 hour Hotlines. Assistance is provided to victims at hospitals and police stations in Norwich and New London. Individual counseling, support groups and referrals to appropriate services are also available. Advocacy to obtain Temporary Restraining Orders and Protective Orders and medical assessments and case referrals

NCC Children's Center

A ministry of this congregation, the Children's Center provides childcare for infants, toddlers and pre-school children year round and offers school age vacation and summer programs. The Outreach Committee provides families seeking financial assistance with scholarships. This service to parents allows them to entrust their children to the loving, supporting, dedicated staff of teachers while they work, without overtaxing their finances. The Children's Center is operated by a center director who supervises a dedicated educational staff and reports to the NCC Children's Center Board of Directors, which consists of church members and parents. The children, parents, staff, volunteers and Board of Directors work together on events outside the normal hours of operation, whether for a holiday party or improving the playground, they truly are a caring, sharing family.

NITCA

NITCA is a model community development project in el Barrio Los Laureles Sur, Managua, Nicaragua. It is a grass roots program started in July 1999 to improve the condition of life for children who work the streets to help their families. NITCA's mission is to face the problem of poverty through education, nutrition, hygiene, health care, and cultivation of the land and to empower the residents through provision of training and work opportunities. Since 1999, NITCA has built a preschool, kitchen and a health center and initiated

family centered agricultural projects and small business start-ups.

Martin House, Norwich, CT

For more than twenty years, Martin House has been a nurturing, interfaith community where individuals of limited income, who have been alone, alienated, and dispossessed, can develop healthy new relationships, dignity and a renewed life. Their mission is to create a continuum of care, which engages the diverse resources of our region to imple-

nity since 1985. Employment Specialists, or Job Coaches, receive specialized training in the areas of job development, marketing, assessment, and job based instruction. Then they help individuals with disabilities learn how to work correctly and retain jobs.

It offers many different programs, including individual placement, high school transition, food services, the Mobile Work Crew, and an agricultural program. The opportunities in agriculture include the Crocker Hill Garden and Gift Shop located in Franklin, CT, and several other community job sites. The programs provide training in the areas of horticulture, animal care, crafts, barn and farm maintenance and horse care.

Candy's Cozy Kitchen, Puffins Restaurant, and Seabird Bakers Too, are small food service businesses also owned and operated by Seabird Enterprises. The programs are open Monday through Friday for breakfast, lunch, and the sale of baked goods as well as restaurant food. Skills taught include baking, cooking, cleaning, food preparation, cash register skills and waiting on customers.

Since its inception, Seabird has helped hundreds of local handicapped residents train and acquire skills that allow them to enjoy social interactions within their communities as well as the benefits of employment. Thames River Family Program (TRFP)

Families come to Thames River Family Program from shelters and other homeless situations. Many have experienced domestic violence, substance abuse, and chronic instability.

Women reside in a well maintained, secure building with their family. They work towards individualized family and personal action plans. Life skill classes in parenting, money management, home management, family health care, self/personal growth, and employment are all part of the

and social services by a trained staff who also provide counseling, training and referral services. Graduates of the program often return to provide inspiration and support to newer members. The Katie Blair House is planning to expand by building a new apartment complex and community center next door to the house, and welcomes donations of money, time, and talents. Many volunteer opportunities are available, and include serving as a mentor, joining them for dinner to talk, teaching piano, computer skills, crafts or hairdressing.

Hospice of Southeastern Connecticut

As an organization dealing with patients with limited life expectancy, Hospice is a choice of care emphasizing quality of life.

Living as fully as possible until the time of death is the philosophy of care at the heart of every hospice program. Hospice care is holistic. Pain and symptom control are most important and the interdisciplinary team also nurtures and supports the emotional and spiritual needs of patients and families. Care is provided regardless of the individual's insurance or ability to pay. Over 75 percent of patients die at home according to their own wishes. As a non-profit group, they rely heavily on donations, grants, fund raising events and memorials.

Seabird Enterprises

Seabird Enterprises was established as a non-profit organization in the town of Groton in 1983 for students and adults with mental retardation or developmental disabilities, to provide them with opportunities in their communities.

The Seabird Individual Placement programs have successfully placed individuals into independent jobs in the commu-

ment a full range of housing options and support services, so that no woman or man remains homeless.



Most of the people who come to the Martin House are trying to escape desperate circumstances. Many have been living outdoors as social outcasts in old automobiles or vacant buildings, often with all their material possessions in a sack or paper bag. Homeless, fearful, and in many cases, labeled as mentally challenged, they find new hope and a chance to regain their dignity at Martin House. By providing a safe, transitional living program, up to fifty-four residents benefit daily from the three nutritious meals and the supervised care on site.

Martin House exists because they believe that we are all brothers and sisters in this world and that we find God in one another. In order to provide the services for their residents, they must raise \$940.00 a year for each person to cover the gap between income and expenses. During their twenty years of service, they have touched the lives of more than six hundred people.

NCC Youth Missions

The Youth of NCC have been on mission trips to various places where they have experienced God working in wonderful ways. The church supports and encourages these trips by offering financial assistance in matching what the youth raise themselves. Recent mission opportunities for our youth have been with YSOP (Youth Service Opportunities Project) and Wanakee United Methodist Center/Heifer Project International Educational Farm. Working with YSOP

volunteers in New York, the youth were able to prepare and serve meals at soup kitchens; provide recreational activities and companionship to young, formerly homeless children; distribute food and supplies at food pantries; and socialize with people in drop-in centers. At Wanakee the youth were able to clear fields for grazing animals, mend/build sheep and chicken shelters, put in fencing and plant seeds, to highlight just a few of their accomplishments. Bethsaida Community : Katie Blair House

In 1987, a group of five women founded a program named the Bethsaida Community, designed to provide a transitional living program for homeless single women in the Norwich area. Its mission was to foster personal growth and healing for women while giving them the training and social services they were lacking. The Katie Blair House was opened in 1990, and over the years has provided more than one hundred women the chance to turn their lives around.



Some of the women come from abusive relationships that they are trying to escape, and some after a period of incarceration. Many are dealing with addictions, lack of education and self-esteem issues. Women who are accepted into the Katie Blair House must show a commitment to the programs and honesty and awareness of what is going on in their lives. They must be able to abide by strict rules during the first six months of their stay. The eight areas of focus are: physical health, emotional health, life training skills, nutrition, cleanliness, relationship skills, employment, and housing. The women are linked to support groups, outside resources

The New London Community Meal Center, also known as the Soup Kitchen, was founded in 1985. The mission of the meal center is to respond to the needs of the most vulnerable residents of the New London community by providing them with nutritious meals in a kind, hospitable and clean environment. Located at 12 Montauk Avenue in New London, it serves a lunch and dinner meal Monday through Friday and a dinner meal on Sunday. Niantic Community Church provides the meal on the 4th Saturday of every month. Prison Ministries

NCC has established a relationship with York Correctional Institute in Niantic. This institution is the only one in the State of Connecticut that houses females. NCC has several outreach opportunities connected with the prison.

Christmas Toy Project

In conjunction with the Chaplain at the prison, NCC hosts a day to wrap toys that are shipped to the children of women incarcerated at York. These gifts are individually labeled to each child from their Mom. Church members are invited to donate toys, wrapping paper, tape, finances to support shipping and TIME to assist in the wrapping. Prison Pup Partnership

York has established this partnership with NEADS to train the finest hearing and assistance dogs for the deaf and physically disabled. They take the puppies on "furloughs" and record their behavior, which is used in determining the final placement of the pups.
