Freedom or connectivity? It often feels like we need to make choices between freedom and connection in our relationships, but is it an either/or, or a both/and? Pastor Kaleigh and I will be exploring this paradox of relationship as we focus on the theme of *Covenant* in worship during the season of Lent.

Covenants come in all varieties. We have covenants with one another, and God also holds covenants with people in history e.g., Noah, Abraham, Jesus, and in our lives today. There are also political covenants embodied in documents like the Constitution of the United States which promise freedoms, but it balances freedoms with responsibilities. The Niantic Community Church is in Covenant with our two member denominations: The United Methodist Church, and the United Church of Christ. We all live with explicit and implicit covenants in our lives – everything from the unions of our parents, to the working hours of our favorite businesses (what do they mean they are closed for the season? I rely on that place!)

This Lent, I invite you to think about your relationships with a view to the kinds of covenants you are keeping with those around you. Is the relationship leaning into connection or leaning into freedom? Is that in keeping with other Covenants that you have made, or are you moving in a new direction? Where is God leading you in covenantal relationships? And how does God continue to be faithful to God's covenant with us?



We do it because we are part of a people who promised to long before we got here, and somewhere in between the action and the act, our covenant deepens, and we are blessed. 




Parish Life Ministries

Our Faith Formation programs have been in full swing. Led by a dedicated group of church volunteers, we provide nursery care and Sunday school each week. Our kids of various ages have participated in worship services as Acolyte (candle lighting) and readers at special services. Planning and raising funds (Cupcakes!) has been underway for the Youth Mission Trip to Rhode Island this July. Club 26 for Grades 2-6 has met several times, and they will be working on several outreach projects for Dine/NL Homeless Hospitality Center Ministry, Care and Share of East Lyme and Waterford Youth Services. Confirmation classes meet regularly, led by Pastors Erica and Kaleigh.



We were glad to welcome Calvin McCoy III and his family to join us in worship on February 4, which happened to be his birthday – we celebrated with cake of course, during coffee hour. Pastor Kaleigh and the children interviewed him during the Children's Message time in the service.



The Other Side of Prospect: A Story of Violence, Injustice, and the American City By Nicholas Dawidoff

This book is a Finalist for the New York Public Library's Helen Bernstein Book Award for Excellence in Journalism; and a Finalist for the American Bar Association's Silver Gavel Award for Media and the Arts. It has been described as a landmark work of intimate reporting on inequality, race, class, and violence, told through a murder and intersecting lives in an iconic American neighborhood.

Black History Month

The Katz Drug Store Sit-In, August 19-21, 1958, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma

The Katz Drug Store sit-in was one of the first sit-ins during the civil rights movement, occurring between August 19 and August 21, 1958, in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. In protest of racial discrimination, black schoolchildren sat at a lunch counter with their teacher demanding food, refusing to leave until they were served. They sought to end the racial segregation of eating places in their city, sparking a sit-in movement in Oklahoma City that lasted for years.

In 1958, even though the "separate but equal" doctrine of Jim Crow Laws had been overturned, racial discrimination was still commonplace and restricted blacks from sharing many public spaces with whites. Black people had to drink from colored fountains, ride the back of buses, and were given their dinners in bags to eat outside of the restaurant. **Clara Luper**, a black high school teacher in Oklahoma City, was a civil rights activist and the advisor for the Youth Council of the Oklahoma City NAACP. Luper took a trip with her students to New York City to put on the play "Brother President," where they witnessed Black people living in a desegregated environment.



They experienced integrated restaurants and other freedoms that Black people in Oklahoma City had not been accustomed to. After their return to Oklahoma, Luper's daughter Marilyn asked, "Why didn't I just go in and ask for a Coca-Cola and a hamburger?" in reference to the Katz Drug Store. This prompted Luper to stage a sit-in with thirteen of her Black students. Along with Clara Luper, the participants of the sit-in were Marilyn Luper, Calvin Luper, Portwood Williams, Jr., Donda West (future mother of Kanye West), Richard Brown, Barbara Posey, Alma Faye Washington, Areda Tollivar Spinks, Elmer Edwards, Lynzetta Jones Carter, Gwendolyn Fuller Mukes, Lana Pogue, Linda Pogue, and Betty Germany. Before the event, Luper gathered the students to teach them about the principles of civil disobedience and to train them on how to react to opposition.

Black History Month

The Katz Drug Store Sit-In, August 19-21, 1958, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma -2-

After their preparation, the first day of the sit-in began on August 19, 1958, when Clara Luper and the children sat down at the counter of the Katz Drug Store and ordered thirteen cokes. They were refused service, but they stayed at the counter for hours while whites kicked them, punched them, spat at them, and poured things on them. They returned for two more days; on the third day of their protest, one of the employees served them their food, ending segregation in the restaurant.

Katz Drug Stores would end their segregation policy as a result of the sit-in. The sit-in also sparked a series of sit-ins throughout Downtown Oklahoma City's restaurants. Similar protests occurred throughout the city until 1964, when Oklahoma City passed an ordinance forbidding restaurants from refusing service or facilities to anyone based on race, religion, color, sex, or national origin. Similar sit-in movements were held across the country, most notably the Greensboro sit-ins and Nashville sit-ins in 1960, which gained national attention. One month after Oklahoma City's ordinance was put into place, the Civil Rights Act of 1964 was passed, which illegalized discrimination across the country.



"on the 15th of February, 1719, the first society meeting was called and it was voted that Mr. George Griswold should be the minister for the society to preach ye gospel."
